

From Sarah Brown McCulloch's *Guilford: A Walking Guide* (2012):

Reuben Stone, 22 Broad Street, Colonial, 1769.

The Greek Revival portico with fluted columns, wide frieze, and sidelights flanking the door was added in 1842 and the roof line was made less steep, in order to give the house a more “modern” appearance. However, look closely at the gable end and you will see, at the level, a slight overhang which testifies to its age. Reuben Stone, brother of Caleb who lived next door, was married twice and had ten children. The Guilford Survey notes that, as a supporter of the Revolution, “he made two trips to New Haven and one to Hartford to arrange procurement of provisions for Guilford’s Revolutionary soldiers. He was reimbursed for this travel on 12 April 1779.” A descendant of the Stones has lived here for many years and has preserved the ancient (1820) cider mill on the property.
