The Greek Revival door on the Colonial facade evidently indicates a desire on the part of a later owner, probably around 1840, to keep up with the times. First floor windows on facade a modern alteration. Sash of other windows altered at various times. Later additions to rear. Aluminum stone sash.

8 NOTABLE FEATURES
The very slight overhang on front and sides with its row of dentils all across the facade (and also over the door) is curious: are the dentils perhaps a later embellishment? Chimney appears to be original.

9. ARCHITECTURAL-HISTORICAL The Connecticut Historical Commission survey of 1972 comments: "It is suspected by local historians that this house is actually earlier than the date of 1788 on the chimney, because of the 1-room depth and shallow overhang. Chimney seems to be of appropriate size."
