The date of 1849 given above is based on a family 8. NOTABLE FEATURES recollection that in November of that year William Weld considered buying the "new" house on this site. Presumably the house was then a 3-bay Italian Villa of the same general type as

No. 79 up the street, a type that the expansive 9. ARCHITECTURAL-HISTORICAL post-Civil War generation found very easy to enlarge by simply popping a mansard on top of the original flat roof. This evidently is what happened here, for the mansard roof, opulently arched dormers, polygonal bays both to the left and the right, and bracketed porch are unmistakable signs of the French Empire Style that flourished in this country in the '60s and '70s but that was as yet unheard of in the 1840s. Notice also the delectable little conservatory with transom lights tucked into the angle of the west wing. All in all, Alfred G. Hull did himself proud, and it is good to learn that he was an eminently respected citizen: Vice-President of the Guilford Savings Bank. Town Treasurer.
