Large South addition (Schilling and Goldbecker, 1954) with 7. ALTERATIONS with glass front facing west; remodeled and bricked up, Further additions to the rear at the same time. 1970s.

Impressive but gracious frontal statement on the street, 8. NOTABLE FEATURES using the vocabulary of the Colonial Revival (frontispiece with pilasters and swags, cupola, and a splended battery of 12/12 windows) to scale a big building down to a town setting.

9. ARCHITECTURAL-HISTORICAL A typical production of the Colonial Revival, reflecting both the new prosperity and civic ambition of the community as well as its awakened need to assert its continuity with the past. There are buildings like this in almost every town in New England. Popularly referred to today as banal, they are dignified, spacious, and humane. They are also well built. In 1890 the town voted to establish a high school in Guilford, as provided by state law, and an arrangement was made with the Guilford Institute (see 120 North Fair Street) to share facilities and funds. The Guilford Institute and High School, so called, remained in the old stone building on the Post Road until the present building was built. In the postwar boom of the '50s, the building was expanded with a large addition, quickly outgrown. A new high school was then (con't, on next sheet)

outgrown. A new high school was then built in 1958, and the existing building became the Junior High until it was reorganized in 1970 as a middle school, and renamed. Dr. Elisabeth Adams came to Guilford in 1950 from New York City where she had a practice in internal medicine, and opened an office on the Green. As Public Health Officer and physician, she has become respected, loved, and depended on by the whole town.
