<ul> <li>Interrelationship of building and surroundings: This property consists of 0.5 acres of land on the east side of Church Street. A driveway extends to the east off Church Street and terminates at a parking area on the north side of the house. To the north of the house is a small shed. A fence runs along the north border of the parcel. Just to the north is the intersection of Church Street and Boston Post Road. Less than a mile to the south is the Guilford Green.</li> <li>Other notable features of building or site (Interior and/or Exterior)</li> </ul>
This is a two story Colonial Revival style dwelling with an attic and a front-gambrel roof. The house is sheathed in wood shingles and the roof is covered with asphalt shingles. The three-bay façade faces west, and the main entry is on the left hand corner (north corner). It is reached by stone stairs with iron railings, and is protected from the elements by an open porch. The porch has a hip-roof which is supported by slender columns. The porch wraps around the south elevation and is enclosed along that side. Fenestration consists of six-over-one double-hung sash windows. An eight-pane circular window is in the attic. Gambrel-roof dormers protrude from south slope of the roof. An addition is on the north elevation, also with a gambrel-roof dormer.
Architect Builder George W. Seward (Helander)
Historical or Architectural importance:
Samuel M. Cornell was the original owner of the house which was built in 1902. Samuel Mott Cornell was born in 1841 in New York. In 1876, he married Rebecca Cleveland Gold in West Cornwall, Connecticut. Shortly after their marriage, they moved to Guilford and purchased a farm on Clapboard Hill Road. In the early 1900s, they sold their farm and moved to Whitfield Street before having this house located at 55 Church Street built. Samuel M. Cornell died in 1903, shortly after the house was built. Ownership of the house was passed to his wife, Rebecca. Rebecca Cleveland Gold was born in 1851 in Cornwall, Connecticut to Theodore Sedgwick Gold and Caroline Lockwood. Samuel Cornell and Rebecca Gold had two children, Theodore Gold Cornell, who died in infancy, and Martha Gold Cornell. Rebecca Gold Cornell died in 1927 after a vacation out west. Martha Gold Cornell acquired the house after her mother's death. (See continuation sheet)

## **Historical or Architectural importance**

The house was built by George W. Seward who was a third generation master carpenter – His grandfather, Martin Seward, and father, George M. Seward, were both master carpenters before him. Seward grew up on Fair Street and is credited as building Boston Street School house, 188 Whitfield Street, the Guilford Town Hall at 31 Park Street, and Governor Rollin Woodruff's summer house at 40 Stonehouse Lane.
