7. ALTERATIONS

The side addition appears to be only a little later than the house itself. Chimney may be rebuilt but in original form and location. The sprightly door hood was probably added soon after the Civil War.

8. NOTABLE FEATURES

Overhanging eaves with a row of diamond shapes below; transom; large stone foundation.

9. ARCHITECTURAL-HISTORICAL

The Griswold house is located in a section of Guilford known as Clapboard Hill. The area lies several miles to the northeast of the village of Guilford and comprises the land on either side of Clapboard Hill Road. The road runs up a hill through open farm land, down across the bridge at the East River and up again through a heavily wooded area. There are a number of fine 18th and 19th century houses on either side of the road; the 19th century are nearly all of the Greek Revival style.

The Griswold house, built early in the 19th century, has the characteristics of the Federal Period. An ell was added to the west side in 1852 and removed in 1912. This house has a (cont. on next p.)

ment. The doorhood is a late 19th century addition.

The house was built by John Griswold II; his wife Hannah was the daughter of Caleb Dudley III, who was born in the earlier house just east of this. It is reported that the Griswold house was raised during a total eclipse of the sun, June 16, 1806. A small meteor is said to have fallen on the property in 1916. The house is still owned by the Griswold family. The small one-room Clapboard Hill School House is located just to the west of this house.
