9. ARCHITECTURAL-HISTORICAL

This house has a Colonial appearance, despite the fact that it was built in the second quarter of the nineteenth century. Even for an architecturally conservative town like Guilford, this is a late example of this style. The typical five bay pattern has been interrupted with the boarding up of the second story central window.

When built, this house was conveniently near the docks, for its owner the harbor master, Capt. Harry Crittenden. The house was bought by Judge Thomas W. Swan, Dean of the Yale Law School, in 1927. Swan served on the U.S. 2nd Circuit Court in New York and lived here for many years. In the 1960's it was haven for a commune.
