8. NOTABLE FEATURES
A variety of trim, clapboard widths, and moulding decorate the surface of the house; frieze windows; elongated modillions; cupola with a finial; two-story bay windows on the side; pediment projecting above the roofline on the facade with a fanlight; plain square post

front porch. 9. ARCHITECTURAL-HISTORICAL

This large Italianate house was built by Christopher Spencer. The house size and fashionable style are what one might expect to have been built for a prosperous industrialist in the late nineteenth century. In the nineteenth century much of the trim would likely have been painted a contrasting color, giving the house rather a different look. The house stands just south of the Spencer Foundry.

In 1851-52, Israel Stowe Spencer and his son, Christopher, bought the Nasup Foundry and machine shop which became the I.S. Spencer and Son's firm. Christopher Spencer was also President of the Guilford Enterprise Company, manufacturer of vegetable ivory goods, and other articles of wood, ivory, metal, composition or rubber, 1877-84.
