8. NOTABLE FEATURES
$8 / 12$ sash except the gable window $(6 / 6)$; wide board covering the sill of the house.
9. ARCHITECTURAL-HISTORICAL

This Colonial house has a five bay facade and a center chimney. The simple form of the house accentuates the wide sill board, and the wide window frames. The Greek Revival doorway, a later alteration, has an extremely broad entablature. This house is a fine example of $18 t h$ century Guilford architecture and an integral part of the outstanding streetscape on Fair Street.
