7. ALTERATIONS

Addition to the rear north portion of the house (has a stone foundation); rear porch; rebuilt chimney.

8. NOTABLE FEATURES

Boxed cornice with a moulding below; 8/12 sash (except in the gable and the second story lean-to portion which are 6/6 sash); Greek Revival doorway with a wide frieze and wide projecting cornice.

9. ARCHITECTURAL-HISTORICAL Economically built around a chimney dating from 1670, this two-story house has a five bay facade.

The house has a one room deep plan with a lean-to addition. Like many other Colonial houses in Guilford, this one was updated with a Greek Revival entryway. The house is located on Fair Street along with several other architecturally important houses.

John Collins came to Guilford in 1669. The following year the Town meeting gave him permission to buy this property from John Stevens. Stephen Spencer, a blacksmith who settled in Guilford in 1724, bought the house in 1726 and lived here until 1737.

The building was used as the Town's alms house from 1814 until 1826 when East Guilford was incorporated in the new town of Madison. At that time, the alms house, valued at \$900 was given to Madison, which sold to sources five years later to private owner, William H. Stevens.
