7. ALTERATIONS

Present brown shingles may be laid over original clapboards, sinking the window trim into the plane of the wall.

8. NOTABLE FEATURES

The octagon had a brief bloom in the 1850s. Though widely popularized, it remained exceptional, and not many are now left. This is the only substantial one in the New Haven area known today.

9. ARCHITECTURAL-HISTORICAL

The Octagonal Villa was the brain child of an eccentric phrenologist named Orson Squire Fowler, who believed that the form was conducive to health and marital happiness and who wrote a book about it called A Home for All... Characteristics of the type are the monitor on the roof, lighting and ventilating the central hall around which all the rooms revolve, and Italianate ornament and broad eaves. Usually either a porch runs all around the building or there is a balcony under each window: both are devices for carrying the eye around the form and seeing it in the round. The Leete house has a barer look than is usual, and it is possible that some such trim has been stripped also that the eaves have been clipped.
