8. NOTABLE FEATURES

Use of shingles and clapboards; overhanging eaves; dormers; two-story bay window; large porch supported by round columns; balustrade on the porch roof; brick foundation.

9. ARCHITECTURAL-HISTORICAL

The basic rectangular shape of this hipped roof house has been disguised through the use of projecting bays and dormers of various shapes in the Queen Anne fashion. The front dormer window and large porch with round posts and a ballistrade, however, have the look of Colonial Revival.

Charles H. Scholey was the owner and editor of the Shore Line Times from November 1895 to April 1921. His obituary on February 19, 1942 states that he built the house on Graves Avenue for his family, which included his wife Jennie G. Griswold Scholey and son Harold.
