8. NOTABLE FEATURES

Overhanging eaves with rafters visible; very modestly decorative bargeboards; arched stairway window; two-story bay (beveled on the first floor); shingles and brackets on the porch; brick foundation.

9. ARCHITECTURAL-HISTORICAL

Most of the typical features of the simpler form of the Queen Anne style are present in this house: visible rafter ends, decorative bargeboards, shingled gable ends (only visible on the porch here), and a two-story bay beveled on the first story. This is a good example of the modest houses built near the turn of the century.

Frank W. Gallemore was the nephew of Charles H. Scholey (42 Graves Avenue), editor and owner of the Shore Line Times, and also worked for the Shore Line Times. An article in the March 13, 1896 edition states that Frank W. Gallemore will supervise the paper during C.H. Scholey's vacation.
