DESCRIPTION

8 NOTABLE FEATURES House - overhanging eaves and raking; decorated bargeboards and stick like design in gable (similar trim on the porch); Barn - board and batten siding; plain bargeboards; openings and hardware intact; no machinery inside.

9. ARCHITECTURAL-HISTORICAL

The vertical board siding is an unusual feature of this house, perhaps the result of its builder's association with the adjacent sawmill. The suggestion of framing members on the gable end of the house is another flourish appropriate to a sawmill owner.

By 1852 there was already a sawmill on this site. The board and batten building here seems likely to have housed the Rossiter sawmill

and shingle works.

Even in poor condition, this complex plays a supportive role in the district, representing the forest products manufacturing that supplemented the agricultural economy of this rural region.

The Rossiters were among the first settlers of North Guilford. Josiah was on the surveying committee (cont'd. on next sheet)
