DESCRIPTION

- 8/12 sash except in the gable (6/6) and over the front door (6/9) all windows were copied from an original window found in the attic; applied lintels on side; crown moulding over front windows; doorway.
- Deacon Pelatiah Leete I, a successful farmer, 9. ARCHITECTURAL-HISTORICAL was the first settler of Leete's Island, the land granted to Governor Leete in 1668.69. Leete built his first house on the south side of the road about 1705, according to Town records. (It was torn down in 1832-33). This, his second, house was built on the north side of the road c1710, according to its current owner who cites soap stone inscriptions regarding corn crop records on the attic roof boards as supporting evidence of this date.

On the other hand, Guilford Tax Records disclose a 54 pound increase, between 1744 and 1746, in taxes imposed on Pelatiah Leete (I), suggesting his acquisition of this house during this period, i.e., about 1745. He died here in 1768. His grandson, Pelatiah (III) inherited the house in 1780. The Leetes owned the property until its sale in 1872. (cont'd. on next sheet)

9. ARCHITECTURAL-HISTORICAL cont'd.

Almost every detail of this house, exterior and interior, is significant because of careful preservation, documentation, and restoration. It is a fine example of the integral leanto house with a five-window facade. It has an 18th century pedimented doorway ornamented with a red rosette in the center of the pediment and in the capitals of the pilasters. Windows and clapboards are precise reproductions of materials found on the house. Thanks to careful restoration, this house gives an accurate sense of the original appearance of Guilford's 18th century houses. Its connection with the area's first settler as well as its architecture make this a singularly important house.

This house is on the National Register of Historic Places.

Regarding the date and item No. 9 (paragraphs 1 and 2 above):-

The information given in these paragraphs was based on research done in the Town Records by Joel E. Helander. See Leete's Island Legacy, pgs. 4, 10, 51.

Also regarding the date: There is a crop mark dated 1732 in the attic of this house. This appears to be the earliest visible recorded date connected with this house.
