7. ALTERATIONS

8. NOTABLE FEATURES

Overhanging eaves with decorative rafter ends; bargeboards; jerkinhead roof; brackets under the eaves; slightly overhanging second story; massive stone base and piers support the front porch; brick chimneys (with corbeled caps); stone foundation.

9. ARCHITECTURAL-HISTORICAL

Dormer ends clipped into jerkinhead forms serve to compress the shape of this house into a dense mass, almost as if to leave no sharp corners to be worn away by the elements. A waterfront location was becoming increasingly important for houses like this around the turn of the century. This huge house was moved out to its present site on the point, having been built a few hundred feet away from the shore. It is an example of the large houses built at the end of the 19th century when Sachem's Head was becoming a fashionable resort area.
