7. ALTERATIONS

Addition on west side; shingles on east wall; 6/6 sash; chimney rebuilt. The Greek Revival doorway is perhaps cl840s.

8. NOTABLE FEATURES

Boxed cornice with a molding below; one 8/12 window in the gable and one 6/6 which appears old; stone foundation. Inside much old work remains. Well maintained, this is one of Guilford's more striking Colonial houses.

9. ARCHITECTURAL-HISTORICAL

The most notable thing about the Lee house is its siting at the head of State Street at the point where State joins North Street and jogs off to the right. The handsome facade closes the long view from the town below and gives definition to the intersection. The oversized Greek Revival door is a happy addition, providing strength and interest at a critical spot.

Samuel Lee served in the Coast Guard in the Revolution, and during his absences his house was often searched by Tories hunting for contraband. They were repeatedly outwitted by the Captain's courageous wife, Alice, about whose strategems a number of stories are told. It was she who fired a cannon to warn the colonists who were working in the fields that the British had landed at Leete's Islander
