8. NOTABLE FEATURES

Overhanging eaves with a moulding below; central brick chimney; 6/6 sash; doorway with slender pilasters and a stylized entablature; front porch with square post (later addition?); stone foundation.

9. ARCHITECTURAL-HISTORICAL

Practically devoid of ornament, the simplicity of this small house becomes its dominant feature. Later additions are set well back. The narrow three-bay width is most unusual for a two-story central chimney house. Set in remote marginal farm and woodland, it is a well-proportioned and interesting rural house.

The name of Eber S. Hotchkiss is assigned to this property on the . 1852 Map. Eber Hotchkiss, a shipwright, built his first vessel, a sloop, in the woods on his farmlocated "about three miles north of the East River Bridge"circa 1835. He then established a yard south of the Bridge where he built and launched a total of 32 vessels, according to his grandson, Charles O. Hotchkiss of Deep River.
