8. NOTABLE FEATURES

9. ARCHITECTURAL-HISTORICAL

The symmetry of this house is emphasized by a pedimented doorway, presumably modified some time after construction of the house. A stone embankment makes a level front lawn to set off this house, which is a landmark at the start of Nut Plains Road.

At one time, two houses in the Nut Plains were identified as Evarts properties; one built by Joseph A. Evarts in 1738 and the so-called "old Evarts Place" built in 1756. In the absence of evidence linking this house to those cited above, it would appear that Abraham B. Evarts' house is a third Evarts inthe Nut Plains area.
