- Interrelationship of building and surroundings:

Located on a .19 acre parcel, this house is located about one tenth of a mile south from the train station and a tenth of a mile from where Old Whitfield Street connects with Whitfield Street at its east end. A driveway extends past the north side of the house and ends at the west corner where there is a white shed. The area is mainly residential except for the close by railroad station where Amtrak and Shoreline East trains come through.

- Other notable features of building or site (Interior and/or Exterior)

This house, built c. 1868, is a Greek Revival style, two story building with a front gable roof covered with architectural shingles and one chimney that faces northeast. A side gable wing forms as "L" and extends off the southeast elevation with a one level side gabled extension off of that. The whole house has white vinyl siding. The front facade has a case window with green shutters at the roof peak. (See C. S.)

- Historical or Architectural importance:

This property originally had another house on it, owned by Martin Blatchley. Nathan S. Camp, a farmer, built this owned and first lived in it on 30 acres of land. Later owners were Aletha Jones in 1888 and Frederick M. Page by 1900. Page worked for the railroad company and lived in the house with his wife Elizabeth and several children. Old Whitfield Street was originally Whitfield Street until 1940 when a federal work project built the street over the railroad, diverting the street into sections, with one now know as New Whitfield Street.

On the next two stories under the cornice returns are five six over six hung sash windows and a red door. One stone step leads up to the entry, which has a simple door surround. The middle section of the wing has two six over six hung sash windows on each story. The last section has a pair of the same windows.
