8. NOTABLE FEATURES

Front doorway with recessed panel pilasters, entablature with large dentils under the cornice, and sidelights; side entrance with sidelights; side entrance with small brackets under the moulding (above door frame); grey granite block foundation.

9. ARCHITECTURAL-HISTORICAL

A pedimented gable pierced by a rectangular window as well as a doorway with stylized pilasters supporting a broad entablature are features of this house that express the Greek Revival idiom. The Samuel D. Cruttenden house exemplifies the rural homes built in Guilford's outlying districts in the 19th century.

In 1848 Eber Cruttenden sold to his youngest child, Samuel, a nine acre tract of land just south of the family homestead for \$225. Two years later, Cruttenden and his bride, Rhoda B. Chittenden, moved in to this house. He sold it and his 50 acre farm to John

A. Phelps of Killingworth for \$2,000 in January 1874.
