7. ALTERATIONS

Side addition; shingle siding; dormers; side fenestration altered; rebuilt brick chimney; Federal doorway with slender columns, and a pediment door hood with dentils.

8. NOTABLE FEATURES Boxed cornice; frieze; 12/12 sash; 8/12 sash in the gable, stone foundation.

9. ARCHITECTURAL-HISTORICAL

The original three-bay house of Joseph Bartlett was enlarged in the Colonial Revival mode of the 1920s and 30s with dormers in the attic, a story-and-a-half dormered extension, and a garage with arched doorways. The shingle siding, probably added at the same time, helps unify the various parts of the house. The slender columned entryway and the shutters are further Colonial Revival touches. is a good illustration of successful blending of 18th and 20th century "Colonial" styles.

Captain Joseph Bartlett acquired this property from Asher Seaward in April 1753, about 79 acres including a "dwelling house with a new frame", a barn and orchard. Bartlett, a deacon of the Fourth Church, lived here until his death in 1769. His eldest son, Joseph II, inherited the property. Joseph II and his sons, Amos and Noah, ran a potash business nearby on the Great Podunk River
