8. NOTABLE FEATURES of the original fabric.

The survival of so rudimentary a house from the period of Guilford's settlement is extraordinary. This house is a vital link to that most distant past.

Built for Ithamar Hall and acquired by Richard 9. ARCHITECTURAL-HISTORICAL Starr not very many years later, this house is still occupied by a member of the Starr family. About the date, which has been occasionaly questioned, David Dudley writes, "It is well documented that the guts of this little house are from 1669." Elmer Keith and others had previously given the date as 1716, and possibly some of the visible work today belongs to that period. any case this miniscule dwelling is one of Guilford's important architectural survivals, not only because 17th century buildings are rare but also because it is a reminder that many people in the early years of the colony doubtless lived in far humbler houses than the large saltboxes that have come down to modern times in far greater numbers. Keith describes it as a single-room, end-chimney house, a type that followed the first settlers dugouts: "though much modernized, this is 10. SOURCES a primitive specimen."
