The Joel and Lucy Griswold house has an unusual asymmetrical facade with two windows on one side of the door and one on the other: possibly the pair is a later addition, as is the Greek Revival doorway. The leanto is of the integral type, as would be expected at this date, and the chimney at the ridge of the long steep roof is of very neatly laid and carefully cut stone.
