The entry porch is a later addition. Chimney appears to have been rebuilt. 2/2 sash; screened porch at rear.

- 8 NOTABLE FEATURES At the head of State Street, just before the Turnpike crosses and the road changes character from town to country, this ample property with its striking composition of white buildings, wide lawn, and big trees brings the whole progression of this distinguished street to a climax.
- 9. ARCHITECTURAL-HISTORICAL
 The even spacing of the five windows along the second story of Capt.
 Samuel Lee's second house is unusual. Normally in this period, the center section, which contains the doorway, gets greater emphasis and more space. An entry portico added later now strengthens the central focus of the facade. A more delicate Federal pediment embellishes a side entrance. This house is set in a wonderful sweep of lawn, near which is a splendid 19th century barn topped by a handsome square cupola.
