9. ARCHITECTURAL-HISTORICAL The Shore Line Electric Railway car barn on Water Street had two tracks with inspection pits at the

West side of the building. At the North end inside, was a retary converter for changing alternating to direct current. The small gable on the East side shows where the feed and loan cables came out of the

building. There was an office, locker room, tool room etc.

The tracks led to the Green and to Stony Creek serving the Stony Creek - Chester Line. All operations were suspended in 1922. Service was resumed in 1924 by the Blakeslee interests as the new owners of the New Haven and Shore Line Railway. Trolley service ended in 1930. The barn was used for bus storage and maintenance until about 1960 when

Trolleys rolled into this two-track barn through the doors in this smooth facade, surmounted by a stepped parapet. Set more than a trolley length back from the street, this low, rectangular block, now a factory producing conveyors, is a discreet neighbor in a residential

neighborhood.
