First floor facade entirely remodeled for new engine doors and a small door at the side; resurfaced and painted white.

8. NOTABLE FEATURES

Stepped parapet; cornice with corbel work below; arched window opening in the front.

9. ARCHITECTURAL-HISTORICAL

A rare example for Guilford of early 20th century concrete block construction, this firehouse facade is highlighted by handsome arched windows on the second floor. Entrance door modifications have covered part of the surface of the building that elsewhere shows the interesting surface of concrete blocks cast to look like stone.

In the 1850s, two fire companies were enlisted by Leverett C. Stone and Charles W. Miller (see 158 Whitfield Street) for the Fire Engine No. 1 and Washington Fire Engine No. 2. The Eagle Hose Company No. 2 was organized in 1888 following a disastrous fire on Water Street. Its first active membership numbered 14. Reorganized in 1897, it had 30 members by 1900.
