## 7. ALTERATIONS

Basement windows added under porch. Small north window replaced one of regular size when the house was bought and renovated 1975-76.

## 8. NOTABLE FEATURES

Broad eave with entablature below; floor-length windows on the first floor front; eared window surrounds; porch extending across the whole front, with paired steps and distinctive rail. Square channeled columns with flat moldings.

9. ARCHITECTURAL-HISTORICAL

Strongly suggestive of Henry Austin's style, this may be his work but more probably is one of the instances where a local builder worked from an Austin design, as we know, for example that William Weld sometimes did. An unexpected detail is the porch rail, which is a copy in wood of the iron fence around the New Haven Green, built at roughly the same time as the house. Double houses, though rare in Guilford, were built in fair numbers in New Haven. Those of the first half of the 19th century are divided horizontally rather than vertically as they would be in the two-deckers of the end of the century. In this way two small houses could be made to look like one substantial one. In the present case the porch ties the two parts together and adds to the imposing effect.
