The Lot Benton house is often called the Lyman Beecher house today after a more famous owner, the great clergyman and revivalist. Lyman Beecher was Lot Benton's nephew and he grew up in North Guilford on his uncle's farm. About the time he entered Yale, Lot Benton moved down to town (to "old Guilford," as Beecher calls it, North Guilford apparently still being "new Guilford"). He settled in the present house, which was then on Broad Street, and Lyman made this homebase until he moved away three or four years later. When Lot Benton died he left the house to Lyman. At this time the First Church was preparing to build a new meeting house, and the Lot Benton house happened to stand precisely on the (continued on next sheet)

most commanding site in town, at the center of the head of the Green. A happy arrangement was made all around. The Church bought the property and promptly sold the house to someone who was willing to move it, and the Lot Benton house went off down Whitfield Street in a still famous procession, drawn by 70 yoke of oxen.

This house is sometimes also called the Eli Foote house and the Jeremiah Rackett house.
